Other ways to start sentences

Sometimes subordinate clauses are introduced, not by a conjunction but by a **non-finite verb**. A non-finite verb is one that does not have a subject: for example, *running*, not *I run*. *I* is the subject of *run*. (For more on subjects, see the section on *active* and *passive* on pages 52 and 53.)

Below are some examples of complex sentences with subordinate clauses that start with non-finite verbs. The subordinate clause is underlined and the non-finite verb is in **bold**.

To thicken the sauce, you will need to use some flour.

Laughing hysterically, Keisha bounced on the trampoline.

Ashamed of what he had done, Declan apologised.
